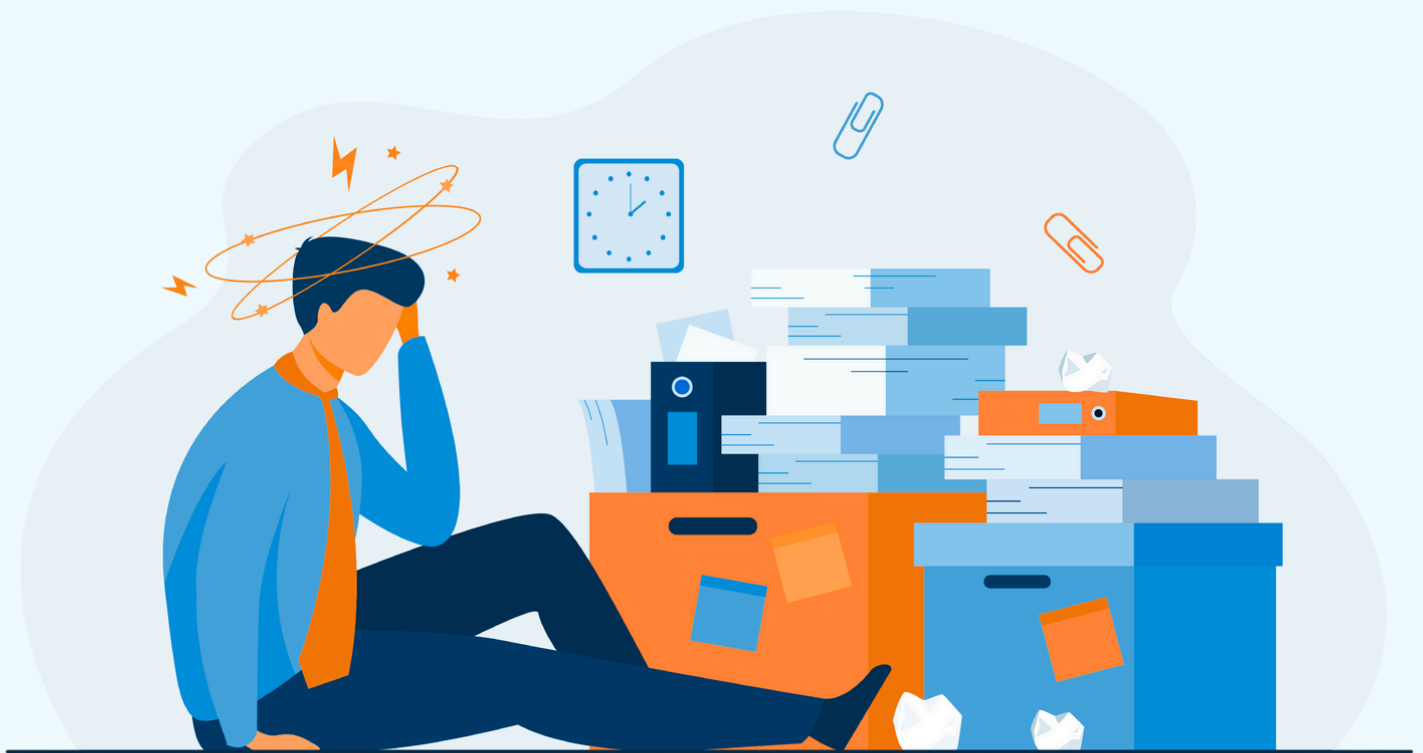

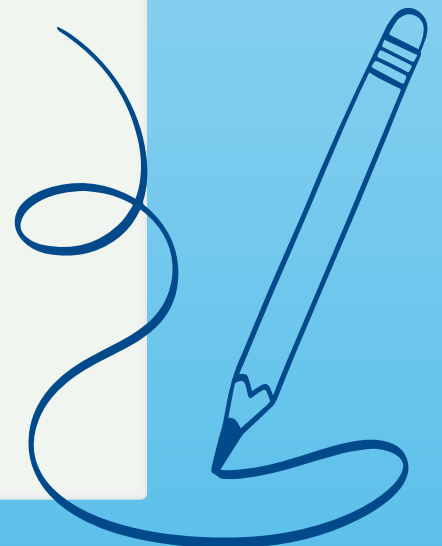

1 Take Stock of Your Draft

Instead of trying to fill in the gaps by putting more words onto the page, pause and summarize what you've already written. Chapter by chapter, make a quick outline of what's happening. You'll spot gaps, inconsistencies, and structural issues—without writing a single new word.



Why it works: You can diagnose the story or content flow *without* getting stuck in sentence-level edits.



2 Get Early Feedback— Even If You’re Not “Ready”

Sharing your work can be scary—especially when your draft still feels rough. But getting outside perspective early is one of the best ways to gain clarity and get unstuck.

If you have a trusted friend, critique partner, or writing group, ask them a few specific questions:

Does the pacing keep you engaged?

Why it helps: You’ll learn if your story drags, moves too fast, or loses momentum in key places.

Do the chapters build logically?

Why it helps: You can assess structure and flow—especially if you’re not sure where to trim or rearrange.

What confuses you?

Why it helps: You can identify moments where readers may get lost—so you can clarify or expand without overexplaining.

Does the opening hook you in—or take too long to get going?

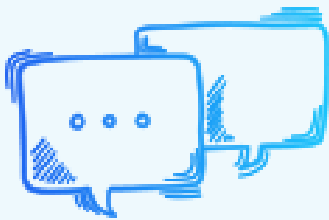
Why it helps: You’ll gain insight into how strong your beginning is—and whether it’s pulling readers in or pushing them away.
